# List of Potential Publishers for “Unearthing Our Roots” and the Requirements for the Proposal

## 1. University of Alberta Press - Not Contacted

- a. About: At University of Alberta Press, we will work with you to transform your research into a bold book, digital publication, or open-access resource that captivates local and global audiences. Publish with us to share your knowledge, influence current thinking, and fuel solutions.
- b. Requirements:
  - i. The working title and a brief description of the work.
  - ii. A more detailed overview of the manuscript that describes:
  - iii. The central argument;
  - iv. The rationale for writing this manuscript;
  - v. If the manuscript is an edited collection or a multi-authored work, please describe the thematic, theoretical, or other structures that will help create consistency across chapters.
  - vi. If the manuscript is based on a dissertation, please tell us when and at what institution it was defended. Also describe the revisions you have made or propose to make; our Recommended Reading list (below) includes resources about this revision process.
  - vii. A table of contents with a brief synopsis of each chapter.
  - viii. If the manuscript is an edited collection, please also include information about the institutional affiliation (if applicable) and citizenship of each chapter’s contributing author(s).
  - ix. Information about the intended audience. What disciplinary background(s) do your readers share? Is your manuscript intended for scholars, practitioners, or policymakers? Is your manuscript intended for course adoption (if so please list relevant course titles and departments/institutions)? Will your manuscript appeal to a general audience (if so, how have you made the writing, concepts, and argument accessible to non-experts)? Please be as specific as possible.
  - x. A list of closely related and competing books. Please describe how each book is similar to or different from the book you are proposing.

## **2. Rocky Mountain Books - Not Contacted**

- a. About: Working with professional authors and experts in their fields, we publish 20 to 30 non-fiction titles every year relating to mountain culture and outdoor lifestyle. Our books are diverse in subject and style with a unifying theme: they are edited, designed, published, and marketed with the same passion they are written.

  - i. A completed author questionnaire.
  - ii. A short cover letter that describes why you think your book should be published.
  - iii. A 250-word synopsis of your book.

  - vi. If your book is to be illustrated, please provide samples (photos, drawings, maps, etc).
  - vii. A recent author photo.
  - viii. A list of your past publishing credits, if applicable.
  - ix. Links to your most active social media platforms (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc).
  - x. Examples of similar or competing books that are currently on the market.
  - xi. Basic demographics relating to your target audience or primary market.
  - xii. A list of bloggers, newspapers, or magazines that may be interested in your book.
  - xiii. A list of promotional ideas that may aid in the sale of your book.
  - xiv. Any other information that may help us to market your book.

## **3. University of Calgary – Bighorn Publishing - Submission made**

- a. About: an imprint of the University of Calgary Press, publishes research-based non-fiction for a general audience with a focus on the hidden corners of history and many fascinating building blocks of society today.
- b. Requirements:
  - i. Completed Manuscript

- ii. Does not list other requirements

#### **4. Heritage House Press - Submission made**

- a. About: Heritage House publishes 20 to 30 new books per year. We mainly publish Canadian authors who write about topics that are relevant to the history, arts and culture, socio-political life, or natural environment of Western Canada (BC, AB, SK, MB, YT).
- b. Requirements: A one-page (250-word) synopsis of the book
- c. A biography of yourself, including your previous publishing history, any awards you have won or been nominated for, and your academic or professional credentials as they pertain to your book project
- d. A preliminary marketing plan for your project, including a description of your book's intended audience, a list of other books on the market that are similar to yours, your social media presence and current public platform, any media contacts you may have who could review or help promote the book, and any other promotional ideas you may have
- e. An outline of the book's contents (or a table of contents)
- f. One to two sample chapters
- g. A sampling of images (if applicable)

#### **5. Dundurn Press - Submission made**

- a. About: Dundurn Press is best known for its robust publishing program spanning these five decades as well as its fiction titles that speak to diverse and international audiences. We publish books that reflect the world, satisfy curiosity, enlighten, and entertain. We seek to amplify and elevate exceptional Canadian voices, particularly those that have not yet been discovered or have been previously underrepresented in trade publishing. We publish across numerous genres, from literary and genre fiction, to true crime, memoir and biography, sport, history and public policy.
- b. Requirements:
  - i. An introductory email telling us about you and your project - subject line should include the title of your project
  - ii. Your manuscript or proposal as an attachment in Word or pdf - please do not share links to Google Drive, DropBox, WeTransfer, etc.
  - iii. Your proposal should include:
  - iv. A short biography of you as the author, with writing credits and other information relevant to your project
  - v. Your contact information and place of residence
  - vi. A short summary of your project - what is it about? Why is it important? Why are you the right person to write it?

- vii. A writing sample - 2-3 chapters or 30-50 pages is ideal for a sample
- viii. Market research into comparative titles - tell us why your book stands out in the market, what is unique about you and your book, what other books are out there for your book to compete with?



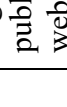
